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


STANDARD EU EVALUATION OFFERS FOUR CHOICES

Q. EU is a good thing, bad thing, neither good nor bad, don't know



BIG MAJORITY OF UK VOTERS AGAINST FURTHER INTEGRATION

Q. Some say European integration should be pushed further. Others say it has already gone too far. What is your opinion? (11 point scale)

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VOTERS SATISFIED WITH STATUS QUO ARE:

JUST AS POSITIVE AS PRO-INTEGRATION VOTERS

- -Just as much knowledge about EU
- -Just as likely to vote in an EP election
- -Watch European election news
- -Educated

BUT SIGNIFICANTLY LESS LIKELY THAN PRO-EU TO:

- -Favour EU
- -Identify as a European
- -Accept level of immigration
- -See self on the left or right
- -Have interest in politics

LOTS OF VOLATILITY

*EU under multi-dimensional pressure to act from: 1

Eurozone/ Unemployment/ Refugees/ Ukraine/ US trade

*UK opinion historically volatile since 1973 ²

Range saying good thing: 23% to 57%

No trend around mean of 38% (R² 0.02)

Only SNP and UKIP give clear partisan cues on voting

Journalists don't understand a poll about how you would vote today is not a forecast

*No majority saying EU a good thing since October 1991

How the ambivalent divide will be critical for the result
