ALL MEMBER STATES EQUAL JURIDICALLY

At the European Union we have a seat at the table with big countries and we also have a microphone.

BUT we must be careful about how others around the table will react before we speak.

A small country ambassador to the EU

MOST EU MEMBER STATES ARE NOT BIG IN POPULATION

*One-third have populations of 5mn or less

*Median third of states: population between 5mn and 11mn Ergo: Austria and Portugal are average EU member state

*The most populous state has only 16% of EU population

AND GDP PER CAPITA IS NOT RELATED TO POPULATION

EU DECISION RULES FAVOUR CONSENSUS

*In EUROPEAN COUNCIL with 345 votes, the most votes a state gets, 29, is medium-sized, not big.

*Super-majorities of votes and population required in Council..

*Votes rarely taken: consensus preferred with some things for (almost) everybody.

*In EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT, degressive proportionality gives small states extra MEPS.

*EP majority requires a Black-Red People coalition representing parties in all member states.

CONSENSUS INVOLVES BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS

Large number of small states limits attention any one can get

BUT also makes broad coalitions the norm

Both medium and smaller states tend to get similar degree of satisfaction on the everyday issues that are the stuff of EU Politics

Internationally EU and USA in guns and money
